THAT DISCORD THING

Or so Nic describes it, in a way that probably reflects the mood of some of the rest of you. And I confess I'm feeling pretty tired and downbeat myself just at the moment – not at all the way I want to be thinking about Corflu, never mind that whole 'VEGAS, baby!' vibe we might otherwise be aiming for – so this isn't an attempt to convert you all to exuberant enthusiasm and praise.

That seems a bit excessive anyway, even factoring in British reserve an' all that. I mean, Discord's just a way to chat to people (mostly in text, although it works quite well for voice and video chats these days too). Lots of you will be familiar with those, and Discord isn't a new innovation for this Corflu; some of you who were members of the Corflus since 2021 will have used the Discord server then – and you can still look back at that in the archive sections for each of those conventions.

What? Why?

I do think that Discord works particularly well for a con like Corflu that's had online participation for years — and this time around that's reflected in the membership tiers, where people who know they can't attend in person and aren't fussed about getting paper publications can join at a special supporting member rate for online access only. (Of course, all members can join the Discord and access whatever programme is streamed, contributing whatever's appropriate for you this time; but it won't break the bank to join in remotely.)

So we've got a way to use text chat for in-person and online members alike while the con is happening – to discuss programme, ask for advice, arrange to meet up (whether for dinner or a catch-up over voice chat), share photos or quotes or the name of that fanzine you couldn't remember in another conversation a few hours ago – and it doesn't depend on the programme stream being live or actually being connected to it.

But, just as importantly, Discord gives us a place to chat in advance: about travel or accommodation or programme ideas or other things to do before, during and after the con – or even fanzines (although steady on). As soon as I can I'll add some of the specific

information in this PR to the relevant channels as a prompt and a reminder, and you can follow up with questions and comments there.

How? Where?

Enough of the sales pitch I implied I wasn't going to do; if you're persuaded to at least check it out, what next? Well, as I said some of this will be familiar to some of you – and if you've chatted on Discord for a previous Corflu, you'll still have access to the server now. Log in to your Discord account (I'll come back to that) and the Corflu server, rebranded for Corflu 41, should be there in your server list over on the left.

If you can't see very many channels, that's probably just because I haven't caught up with you being a member of this Corflu! The #welcome channel itself will explain more; but drop a message into the #welcome or #help-desk channels (tag me @ClaireBrialey if you're feeling a sense of urgency) and I'll give you access to all the delights that Corflu 41 currently holds, with more — especially program(me) — to come. And if you're not a member yet, maybe now's the time to join, one way or another.

If all of this is oddly familiar but you know you haven't used Discord for Corflu before, or actually ever, that might well be because you read the PRs for Corflu 39 (Pangloss, in Vancouver in 2022) and so have seen me trying to explain it before. I won't repeat myself in full, because by more wonders of modern technology – and thanks, as so often, to Bill Burns – you can still read those articles in their original form, and I do encourage you to do that to help to get set up and jump in; they include a direct invitation link to the Corflu server. But let me know if you need another one.

What fresh hell is this?

But I mentioned logging in. Steel yourselves... I know some Corflu members – including several quite active in the Discord server – have ended up with two (or more!) accounts, usually due to using a different device

while travelling than the one you'd originally used to join Discord and not having the password for your first account. This means that some of you have got doppelgangers on the server now, and that can seem a bit confusing and makes it harder for people to know which version of you to tag to attract your attention.

If you need to maintain two accounts, perhaps you could change the server name (badge name) so include 'home' and 'away' or 'US' or 'travelling' or whatever distinguishes the accounts for you! And please do tell me (in #helpdesk or via a direct message) whether in practice you're only using one of them for Corflu 41, and I'll sort that out on the server to make it less confusing for everyone else.

Otherwise, while there's time before the con, perhaps you could pick one account, make sure the password is something memorable for you while still being good and strong, and log into that across all your devices? And, of course, tell me what you've done.

WTF?

Beyond that, this is a warning for those of you who haven't logged in for a while. Don't be alarmed, but Discord has rolled out some changes to make people's usernames more meaningful – specifically, to get rid of the four-digit identifiers they added to the username originally.

So you're likely to get a banner message when you log in asking you to choose your username (if you have got more than one account, and want to keep them all, think in advance how you'd like to distinguish them). You'll also be prompted to pick a display name, which will be the default for any server you use unless/until you choose a server name there. Please do contact me if you want to get back into Discord but want some handholding from someone who muddled through it more easily than I expected!

Remind me...?

And more generally otherwise, do consider using the Corflu Discord server as a place to chat to other members. Try to post in a relevant channel (there's a summary at the top of each one), remember you can tag other members and cross-reference other channels too, be assured that you can edit your own messages for typos rather than having to post again, and be excellent to one another.

I find I'm looking forward to being less tired and getting more involved in Corflu 41 again. So thanks for the time to work round to that, and I'll see you there – in Discord and, I hope, in person too.

SMOKIN'!

Mentioned over in the Facebook group (https://www.facebook.com/corflu), all the rooms at the Gold Coast are non-smoking (including the consuite, of course), as is the function space. Smoking is ok on the casino floor, and outdoors. Flouting this room rule will incur a \$250 clean-up charge.

The use and possession of cannabis products is also <u>prohibited</u> anywhere on hotel property (as it is in *every* hotel). Anecdotal evidence might suggest that there isn't excessive diligence in enforcing this, but the policy remains, so partakers should bear this in mind and apply discretion.

DRIVERS' ED

Some of you will, we know, either be driving in or will rent a car for pre-, post- or during Corflu excursions. Most renters will default to the large car rental facility close to the airport, but it's worth noting that there are rental places all over the valley and their rates won't be consistent with each other, so if you can be bothered, it may be worth shopping around.

Something not previously noted: self-parking at the Gold Coast is free.

Room rates:

Typically Vegas hotels quote room rates which are then subject to an added "resort fee" and hotel tax of 13.38%. To save you the anguish, the rates we quote here are <u>inclusive</u> of all that:

Thursday: \$98.63

Friday/Saturday: \$137.18

Sunday: \$82.76

These rates are for single or double occupancy. For triple occupancy, add \$22.68 (including taxes) per night, quad add \$45.35. The Sunday rate also applies for the couple days before and after the convention.

To book online and get the group rate:

To book over the phone:

- 1) Call the Reservation Hotline @ 888-402-6278
- 2) Inform the agent you want to book using group code CORB24C

All reservations must be made using the group code and must be made prior to February 2, 2024 to be eligible for the group rate.

We've heard from some members that booking online doesn't always work, but booking by phone definitely does.

Deposit and cancellation policy:

When you book your room, the hotel charges the first night to your card as a deposit. If you need to cancel, this needs to be done at least 24 hours before scheduled arrival to get your dosh back.
